Overview of Course

This course is designed to acquaint students with the field of **communication studies**. We will take a somewhat **unique approach** to this task, principally in two ways: (1) by treating knowledge about the field, **not as a "laundry list"** of **perspectives**, **theories**, and **approaches** (which in any case are far **too numerous** to cover) in favor of approaching the field **as a culture**, with all the **common understandings** and **disputes** that any culture necessarily has; and (2) taking a **popular, highly-developed social system** and relating the knowledge of the complex world of communication studies **to that culture** (for the **target culture**, I have chosen the environs of the world of **Batman** (particularly **Arkham City**). Students will be able to take their **new-found knowledge** of the field of communication studies and freely **create exciting scenarios** involving Gotham City and Batman's various **enemies, friends, and helpers**.

What is Expected of You

1. Class preparation and participation. To get the most out of the class, you must complete readings for the days assigned. You are expected to contribute to discussion, based on what you read and observe. If you come unprepared, you not only miss opportunities to participate, but this will reflect negatively on your grade. Your final grade is based in part on your participation in discussion.

2. Punctual, consistent attendance. You get three "free" absences; beyond that, each absence results in a 20-point deduction from your grade. You must also be on time. If you come late, not only are you subject to penalties for class disruption (see below), but you may also be counted absent. Attendance is taken by means of a roster sheet you must sign. This sheet is the final arbiter in disputes over whether you attended on a particular day or not. Attendance on exam days is mandatory: no makeups.

3. *No class disruptions.* Among "disruptions," I count: (1) **talking during lecture** or **"off-topic" during class discussion**; and (2) **eating and drinking**. If you come in **after class begins**, note on the roster the **time you entered**. **No penalty** is applied on a **first infraction**. On a **second infraction**, **10 points** are deducted. On a **third infraction**, another **20 points** are deducted and **administration notified** a problem exists. Further infractions are **counted as absences**, penalties as incurred by **excess absences**.
